
# BRIXTON BEE WILD GROUP




# 2022/2023

Throughout the year we were kindly sponsored by Yealm Community Energy, Great Big Green Week and the Locality Fund of Councillor Matt Chown. Brixton Bee Wild Group would like to thank you all for your support to our group, our community and our wildlife.

### 1. Brixton Bee Wild Group – Year 2

- During 2023/23 Brixton Bee Wild Group met nine times, developed its second Action Plan and continued to work on improving the parish verges.
- We hosted a further Bee Friendly Event under the banner of Great Big Green Week.
- We planted trees, bulbs and wildflowers.
- We worked with similar groups, our school, church, volunteers, friends and family to help improve our environment for our community, the birds and the insects.
- We extended our work into the Carrollsland area.
- We helped to spread the word about the importance of water conservation.



## 2. Brixton Bee Wild Group - Year 2 cont'd

- We began to monitor our beautiful heritage trees and any planning applications which may affect them.
- We continued to promote the natural establishment of wild flowers by reducing mowing.
- We began to develop a snowdrop walk.
- And we have celebrated the wonderful work of our volunteer groups – usually over cake and a coffee.



## 3. We helped to plant trees.

- The summer heatwave of 2022 presented its challenges but thanks to our team of watering helpers, the 11 Trees for Bees which we planted in the verges last year continued to look healthy. We enjoyed seeing them come into flower for the first time.
- We helped to plant 3 more trees this year to celebrate the Coronation.



#### 4. We added bulbs and wildflowers to our verges

- We planted bulbs at Carrollsland and at Cofflete Creek and on Steerpoint Road
- We added cowslips, teasels and evening primrose to some of our verges with varying success - and we learnt a lot along the way.



### 5. We hosted a further Bee Friendly Event - Great Big Green Week

- At our Great Big Green Week Family Event attendees enjoyed a range of activities in the autumn sunshine – from planting bulbs to building bird boxes, taking part in quizzes and contributing environmental ideas on our sharing board – see wordart on cover.
- Our popular tree walk focused on the changing colours of autumn.
- The school requested a Big Bug Hotel for its project and one of our colleagues has been busy building this for them.
- We celebrated the work of our volunteer street sweepers and litterpickers with a special Litterpick Event followed by coffee and cake at The Foxhound.
- We bought some water butts and focused on people new to saving water to allocate them.
- The group enjoyed a morning scarifying, scattering and trampling mown hay to spread wildflower seeds in Sherford Country Park.
- We met at Cofflete Creek to promote this old mill site as an amenity space. Bulbs and wildflowers were planted and the new information board was much admired.
- A well-attended Harvest Festival service at St Mary's Church was followed by a Harvest supper.
- We all agreed that Great Big Green Week was tiring but very rewarding.

- We plan to improve wildflower planting on the verge around one of our bus stops.
- We aim to introduce some bat and owl boxes into our community.
- Also, we would like to investigate the introduction of Bat Detectors with possible live feed recording.
